FUNDAMENTAL CONCEPTS IN DESIGN

Introduction to the design process - factors influencing machine design, selection of materials based on mechanical properties - Preferred numbers- Direct, Bending and torsional loading- Modes of failure - Factor of safety – Combined loads – Principal stresses – Eccentric loading – curved beams – crane hook and ‘C’ frame- theories of failure – stress concentration – Fluctuating stresses – Endurance limit –Design for finite and infinite life under variable loading.

DESIGN OF SHAFTS AND COUPLINGS 9

Shafts and Axles - Design of solid and hollow shafts based on strength, rigidity and critical speed – Keys and splines – Rigid and flexible couplings.

DESIGN OF TEMPORARY AND PERMANENT JOINTS 9

Fasteners - Bolted joints including eccentric loading, Knuckle joints, Cotter joints – Welded joints - Butt, Fillet and parallel transverse fillet welds – welded joints subjected to bending, torsional and eccentric loads, riveted joints for structures - theory of bonded joints.

Types of springs, design of helical springs–surge in springs, Design of laminated springs - rubber springs - Flywheels considering stresses in rims and arms for engines and punching machines – Selection of Sliding contact and rolling contact bearings.
