3. You have a digital camera that captures images in the RAW format, which has a higher dynamic range than most display devices can show. Implement histogram equalization, stretching to improve the contrast of these images and histogram

mapping to adjust the exposure and dynamic range of these images so that they can be displayed on a standard monitor.

4. Your client has provided you with a set of images that have been captured using a low-quality camera. They want you to smoothing out the rough edges and also sharpen the edges.
5. Your lab has been tasked with creating a program that can scale, rotate, translate and shear an image. The program needs to be able to handle images of different sizes and aspect ratios.
6. You have a binary image that contains small gaps, specks and noise in the foreground. Implement dilation and closing on the image to fill in these gaps to create a continuous foreground, erosion to remove specks and opening to remove noise.
7. Given an image of a handwritten letter, implement edge detection to highlight the edges of the letter.
8. You have a dataset of images of different animal faces. Implement feature extraction to identify the unique features of each animal's face.
9. You have a video stream from a surveillance camera overlooking a parking lot. Implement moving object detection to identify cars entering and exiting the parking lot.
10. You have a series of images taken from a drone flying over a city. Use image panorama to stitch these images together to create a high-resolution map of the city.
11. You are working on a project to develop an image classification system that can identify different types of animals in images. The dataset contains images of various animals, including dogs, cats, and birds. Your task is to annotate each image with the corresponding animal label.
